Debbie Rosenberg now has four medals, 2 gold and 2 bronze, three of them were with her husband Michael, the fourth was at Women's Teams.

The losing finalists of the Mixed Teams were allowed to enter the final of the BAM, enabling the Edmonds team to win a second medal. That gave Justyna Żmuda a ninth medal, Katarzyna Dufrat a seventh. Marion Michielsen also reaches nine medals. There are now six women who have more medals than the best-scoring man.

Michał Klukowski wins his third consecutive bronze medal at Mixed Teams, He now has five medals, all won with his wife Justyna.

Piotr Tuszyński becomes the second male player after Philippe Cronier to win five medals at European Transnationals. with successes in Open Pairs (gold 2005) and Open Teams (gold 2013, silver 2005 and bronze 2003).

Pierre Zimmermann has four medals now, after 3 successes at Mixed Teams (gold 2011, bronze 2015, '19).

Zia Mahmood is the top non-European. He now also has four medals, after the 2019 senior team gold, and two Open Pairs' silvers (2013, '17)

This is also Krzysztof Martens' fourth medal.

The seniors were allowed to drop into their Pairs Final, thus allowing four players to win a second medal within two days.

The B-fnals for Mixed and Senior Pairs were joined, and won by Barbara & Tomasz Gotard of Germany. They could have started in either event, but actually competed in the Mixed Pairs.

Janice Seamon-Molson wins a fifth medal and a second title, after the 2013 Women Pairs. It is also the fifth medal, but only the first gold one, for Nevena Senior.

Thomas Bessis had already won the Open Teams in 2007. Philippe Soulet won silver in the inaugural Open Teams in 2003. Twenty years later, he goes one better.

Sabine Auken and Roy Welland are the first pair to win the Open Pairs a second time, after 2013. They also won one silver medal at Mixed Pairs in 2017. Roy also won the initial Mixed Teams in 2003, when Sabine won bronze. Sabine has one extra medal, Women Team bronze in 2009.

Philippe Cronier extends his lead as the most medalled man, now totalling eight. His wife Bénédicte has six medals.

The B-fnal for Open and Women Pairs was won by Ahu Zobu and Mustafa Akhun of Türkiye. 141 separate individual medals were awarded in these championships, but 19 players won two medals. leaving 122 medallists, from 18 different countries.

António Palma becomes the first medal winner from Portugal, which becomes the 36th country to medal at European Championships.

France (146) passes the Netherlands (120) in winning most medals at the Open Europeans. They also have the most gold medals (53) Poland (109) is third in the nations' ranking, ahead of USA (91) and Italy (87).
